

Solutions

S1. Ans. (a)

Sol. The error is in the second part of the sentence as one of the important rules for a grammatically correct sentence structure says that *when in a sentence Ordinal adjective such as first, second, third, last etc. and cardinal adjective such as one, two, three, four etc., are present together, then the cardinal adjective must follow the ordinal adjective.* Eg. "The first five questions.". However, the other parts of the sentence comprehend the grammatical syntax of the sentence and are correct and do not require any changes. Thus, **option (a)** becomes the most viable choice.

S2. Ans (d)

Sol. To correct the first and third part of the sentence, replace "**would have they wanted**" with "**Had they wanted**" and "**have been gone home**" with "**have gone home**" respectively as to express an unfulfilled condition, desire, wish of past "**Had+Subject+V3, Subject + would/ could/ might/ should + have + V3**" syntax is used. *The conditional perfect is formed using would have together with the past participle of the main verb. It refers to an impossible condition in the past and its probable result in the past.* Other part of the sentence is grammatically correct and doesn't require any changes. Therefore, with the given rationale **option (d)** is the most viable choice.

S3. Ans. (d)

Sol. All the three parts comprise either grammatical or contextual error in them. In **the first part** replace "**To consider our own history**" with "**Considering our own history**" to eliminate the contextual error. '**to consider**' means to think about (something or someone) carefully especially in order to make a choice or decision while '**considering**' can be used as a preposition or conjunction which means taking into consideration. In **the second part** of the sentence replace "**than**" with "**to**" as for the words like 'preferable, senior, junior, superior, inferior, posterior' '**to**' is used. The word prefer itself means choosing one thing over another and as per grammatical usages, generally prefer is used when two nouns are referred Eg. I prefer tea to coffee. Moreover, in **the third part** of the sentence "**to**" should be replaced with "**too**" to make the sentence logical and meaningful. "**to**" as a **preposition** means approaching or reaching (a particular condition); while "**too**" is an **adverb** which means to a higher degree than is desirable, permissible, or possible; excessively. Hence, as all the three parts contain error in them **option (d)** becomes the most viable answer choice.

S4. Ans. (a)

Sol. To make the syntax of the sentence grammatically correct replace "**You will meet not only**" with "**Not only will you meet**". "**Not only**" should be used before "**meet**" and not after. As "**Not only...But also**" is used to connect two subjects, objects or verbs. It means that the words following both parts of this correlative conjunction (i.e., not only and but also) should belong to the same parts of speech. For example, if a verb follows not only, then a verb should also follow but also. The other parts of the sentence do not contain any error in them, therefore, **option (a)** becomes the most suitable answer choice.

S5. Ans. (e)

Sol. The given sentence is both grammatically and contextually correct. The sentence is in simple present tense and the syntax followed is precise. Therefore, none of the parts requires any changes. Hence, **options (e)** becomes the most feasible answer choice.

S6. Ans. (b)

Sol. There is a grammatical error in only the part (II) of the sentence, the verb "**are**" should be replaced by "**is**" as the subject of the verb is singular [**the entire idea**]. The other two parts are both grammatically correct and contextually meaningful. Hence option (b) is the correct choice.

S7. Ans. (c)

Sol. There are grammatical errors in both the parts (I) and (II). In the part (I), the determiner "**much**" should be replaced by "**many**" as the noun it signifies is **countable [city dwellers]**. It is to be noted that both '**much**' and '**many**' are determiners, and have the same or similar meaning i.e., '**a lot of**', or '**in great quantities**', or '**a great amount**', but their usage differs. If a noun is an uncountable noun (which is often in singular form), the 'much' determiner should be used, while the determiner 'many' should be used with countable nouns, or plural nouns. In the part (II) of the sentence, the preposition "**along**" should be replaced by "**with**" as "**to have some links with their rural homes**" is the correct expression in the context of the sentence. The part (III) of the sentence doesn't require any correction. Hence option (c) is the correct expression.

S8. Ans. (a)

Sol. There is an error in only the part (I) of the sentence, the singular form of the word "**group**" should be replaced by its plural "**groups**" as the word is used for all three: women, youth and elderly citizens i.e., **group of women, group of youth and group of elderly citizens**. The other parts of the sentence are both grammatically correct and contextually meaningful. Hence option (a) is the correct choice.

S9. Ans. (e)

Sol. The given sentence is both grammatically correct and contextually meaningful. Hence option (e) is the correct choice.

S0. Ans. (b)

Sol. There is an error in the part (III) of the sentence, the verb "**support**" should be replaced by "**supports**" as the subject of the verb is singular [**MSP**]. The other parts of the sentence are both grammatically and contextually correct. Hence option (b) is the correct choice.

S11. Ans. (c)

Sol. From the given sentences, the use of '**REVISED**' in the (i) and (iii) sentence is grammatically as well as contextually incorrect. Also, in the second sentence it doesn't make a contextually meaningful sentence. Whereas, option (iv) is the only sentence in which the highlighted word is used correctly. Hence, the correct answer choice would be option (c)

S12. Ans. (e)

Sol. Consensus means a general agreement.

So, going through the given sentences it can be seen that the usage of the given word is incorrect in the sentence (ii) and (iii). In sentence (ii) the hint can be taken from the word 'away' so instead of 'Consensus' it should be 'fritter'. And, sentence (iii) which is talking about the turbulence in West Asia which resulted from the nuclear missile tests, the correct word should be 'Consequence' instead of 'Consensus'. The usage of the given word in the sentence (i) and (iv) is grammatically as well as contextually correct. Hence, the correct answer choice would be option (e)

S13. Ans. (b)

Sol. Hinders means make it difficult for (someone) to do something or for (something) to happen. The usage of the word 'Hinders' in the sentence (i) and (ii) is incorrect because this is making the given sentence grammatically incorrect instead it should be 'Shown' and 'Around' respectively which will make the given sentence both grammatically and contextually correct. The usage of the word 'Hinders' is correct in the sentence (iii) and (iv). Hence, the correct answer choice would be option (b)

S14. Ans. (e)

Sol. Endorsed means declare one's public approval or support of. Going through the given sentences, the usage of 'Endorsed' in sentence (i) might appear contextually correct but it will make the given sentence grammatically incorrect. Also, in sentence (iii) the use of 'Endorsed' is incorrect instead it should be 'Create' to make the given sentence grammatically and contextually correct. The usage of the given word in the sentence (ii) and (iv) is both grammatically as well as contextually correct. Hence, the correct answer choice would be option (e)

S15. Ans. (b)

Sol. Endeavour means try hard to do or achieve something.

In the given statements, the word 'Endeavour' is correctly used only in sentence (i) and (iii). Whereas, in sentence (ii) it should be 'causalities' instead of 'Endeavour' as the given sentence is talking about the fire outbreak in the MTNL/ BSNL building. And in sentence (iv) it should be 'Investigate' instead of 'Endeavour' because the given sentence is talking about the custodial arrest of activist on the charges of the rape. Hence, the correct answer choice would be option (b).
