Answer: D

Sol: The correct answer is (d) Only 1

- **Gudi Padwa** marks the **Hindu New Year** in Maharashtra and some parts of Karnataka, based on the **lunisolar calendar (Chaitra Shukla Pratipada)**.
- Statement 2 is incorrect: **Gudi** refers to a **flag-like arrangement with a kalash (pot) hoisted on a stick**, symbolizing victory and prosperity, not a scripture.
- Statement 3 is incorrect: Traditions begin with **eating neem leaves mixed with jaggery**, symbolizing the balance of bitter and sweet in life, not sweets.

Information Booster:

- Celebrated mainly in **Maharashtra, Goa, and Karnataka**.
- Coincides with **Ugadi** in Andhra Pradesh/Telangana and **Navreh** in Kashmir.
- Marks the harvest season and the coronation of **Lord Rama** in some traditions.

- First Plan actual growth: **3.6% vs target 2.1%**.
- 10th Plan target: 8% → achieved ~7.6%.
- Plans guided India's socialist path until NITI Aayog replaced Planning Commission in 2015.

- Escape clause allows deviation (0.5%) in case of emergencies like war or calamity.

- When adulterated wheat flour containing chalk is mixed with **vinegar (acetic acid)**, it reacts to release **carbon dioxide gas**, producing a **fizzing/bubbling effect**.
- This simple household test confirms the presence of chalk powder.

Information Booster:

- $\text{CaCO}_3 + \text{CH}_3\text{COOH} \rightarrow \text{Ca}(\text{CH}_3\text{COO})_2 + \text{CO}_2 \uparrow + \text{H}_2\text{O}$.
- Chalk powder increases weight of flour but reduces its nutritional value.
- Food adulteration is punishable under the **Food Safety and Standards Act, 2006**.
- Other common flour adulterants: soapstone, starch, powdered rice.
- Iodine test is used for detecting **starch** adulteration.

- (b) **Iodine solution** → Turns **blue-black** in presence of starch, not chalk.
- (c) **Heating over flame** → Detects adulterants like castor oil cake in pulses (odor), not chalk.

- Unlike feudal aristocrats, the **merchant and industrial capitalist class** directed this capital into industries like textiles, iron, and coal.

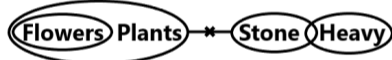

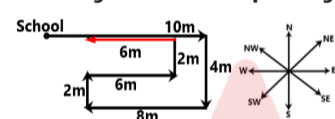

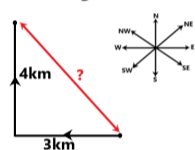

- **Backshift of tense:** Reporting verb **said** is in the past; hence the present/present-like form **dare not** becomes **dared not**. (With the semi-modal **dare**, backshift is handled like a regular verb: dare → dared; also acceptable in general English is didn't dare.)
- **No change in time/place words** here, and the object **him** remains the same.
- **Why the other options are incorrect:**
- (a) **has not dared** (present perfect) conflicts with the past reporting verb and the absence of a continuing result; unnecessary shift.
- (b) **had dared not:** word order is faulty (had not dared would be the acceptable order), and past perfect isn't demanded without a second, earlier past reference.

Structure:

· **Passive Voice:** Object (The cake) + was + V3 (baked) + by + Agent (Mary) + Adverbial (for her brother's birthday party).

· **Active Voice:** Agent (Mary) + V2 (baked) + Object (the cake) + Adverbial (for her brother's birthday party).

· Thus, "Mary baked the cake for her brother's birthday party."

· **Information booster:** The adjunct "for her brother's birthday party" remains unchanged. If the agent is unknown/irrelevant, the **by-phrase** is often omitted in passive constructions.

Passive: **The instructions should have been being followed carefully (by them).**

Why the others are wrong / weaker:

- **(A)** ... *should be followed* ... → drops **perfect** and **continuous** aspects (only modal simple passive).

- (a) **the day after** indicates future relative time (incorrect).
- (b) **the following day** also indicates future relative time (incorrect).
- (d) uses **had** (simple past) instead of **had had** (past perfect).

- (c) advised misrepresents the force of a military command.

· **Rule recap:** Imperative ⇒ Reporting verb (order/ask/request) + object + **to + V1**; negative imperative ⇒ **not to + V1**.

Adverb placement should remain natural (usually after the object or at the end).

Structure:

- Passive Voice: Subject + has/have been + V³ + (by + Agent) + Adverb
- The final draft of the report + has been + reviewed + (by the supervisor) + thoroughly.
- Active Voice: Agent (now Subject) + has/have + V³ + Object + Adverb
- The supervisor + has + reviewed + the final draft of the report + thoroughly.
- Why others are wrong: (b) changes tense (past simple). (c) changes aspect to past continuous. (d) changes to past perfect. The original is present perfect, so only (a) preserves both meaning and tense.

Information booster: When a relative clause follows this pattern, the relative-clause verb generally agrees with the plural noun: He is one of the students who are brilliant.

Information booster / exceptions:

- Succeed to + noun is correct in the sense of inherit/come into a position: He succeeded to the throne. (Here, to is part of the phrase meaning inheritance, not followed by a verb.)
- When you want an infinitive, choose a different verb: He managed to win the prize.

Information booster / exceptions: Some 'h'-initial words vary historically (a historic vs an historic). Modern standard usage favors "a historic event" because h is pronounced. Always check pronunciation, not spelling.

- Hard vs. hardly: hard (with effort) is the adverb; hardly means "barely," not "with effort."
- Late vs. lately: late (adverb: not on time), lately (recently).
- High vs. highly: fly high (adverb of manner), highly (to a high degree: highly skilled).

· **Example:** The committee comprises ten members. / The committee consists of ten members.

· **Information booster / exceptions:** Though "comprised of" appears in informal usage, many style guides (e.g., formal academic or exam contexts) still flag it as **incorrect**; prefer "comprises" or "is composed of."
